

Hi folks,

Some years ago I went to Knapdale Forest in Argyll to see the beavers that had recently been released. Early one morning before dawn I stood on the edge of midge-infested loch. I heard gnawing but could see nothing. Later, as I wandered around the loch, I noticed a floating log — only when I saw its eyes and ears did I realise it was a beaver!

The release of beavers in Scotland – and an 'accidental' release in Devon – is an example of re-wilding: the re-introduction of once-native species that have become extinct in the UK.

This week I went to a conference which focussed on Fresh Expressions of church in the countryside. It's an exciting conference to go to because it's full of pioneer ministers who like to think outside the box, to dream about new ways of doing church – and who have the courage to enable these dreams to become reality.

In the final talk of the conference, George Lings mused about whether we need to think about re-wilding the church. This is a phrase that immediately struck me. He was effectively asking whether the church has become so

tame that we've lost the essential wildness of what it means to follow God. The ancient Celtic Christians, who were the pioneer Christians in these islands, knew and loved the wildness of the Holy Spirit.

One of the characters in *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* speaks about Aslan, the lion, this way: "Safe? Who said anything about safe? 'Course he isn't safe. But he's good. He's the King, I tell you." Perhaps we need to remember that God is neither safe nor tame – but that he is very good.

12th Annual Bunny Hop 2019 Kate Bullock

Phew! Well, what a scorcher that was! Conditions were ideal for a memorable run and a course record, and that is exactly what we got.

The legendary Easter Monday 'Bunny Hop' sounds rather benign and gentle, but it is a rigorous seven and a half mile cross country run that is highly enjoyable as well as challenging in a way a straightforward 10k is not. Some of the 144 participants this year were 'Couch to 10k' runners who were delighted by their success, and all runners were enthusiastically encouraged by each other and the delightful atmosphere that prevails at this yearly event.

The blazing winning time was set by City of Salisbury Athletic Club runner Stuart Holloway at 41:45, with second place, Neil Golding, a respectable 45:55. Ruth Thom, also City of Salisbury, was the first female runner in at 52:23.

Shapwick Runner's own Tom Mills was the first local athlete home with Jennifer Tweedy in 2nd for Shapwick. Lovely to have the village so well represented. We had our first international runner this year. Zoltan Svavai from Hungary was holidaying with his family in Devon and decided to join in. His wife and two sons walked the 4 mile route round Shapwick organised for non-runners. Please join in the walk next year as we'd love to see more local participants.

Simon Clarke, the Senior Reserve Manager of Shapwick Heath also ran again. He is happy to encourage us to disturb the auiet of the reserve!

There was an excellent show from local individuals as well as clubs; from Wells, Langport, Cheddar, Clevedon, Mendips and Weston amongst others. Ages ranges from 21 to 75, which is extraordinary. Some runners' vests bore the legend, 'No Excuses'! Sue Nicholls, from Burnham-on-Sea Harriers, aged 73, won her age category at the Bunny Hop and then repeated this feat at the London Marathon on the following Sunday.

As well as the main event, there is a junior run for young athletes. Unusually there were no Key Stage 1 (age 5-7) runners this year - we'd love to see some new recruits in 2020!

The winners of the KS 2 race (age 7-11) were James Huddart and Chloe Carter, a really hard run and exciting race, closely contested right up to the finish line for both.

For the first time this year we held the Junior Mile Race, filling the gap for 11 to 16 year-olds who are too young to enter the full Bunny Hop.

They navigated a potentially treacherous course along Kent Lane, over ploughed fields and a plank bridge, but we're happy to say all of our ten pioneers returned safely. First boy was Jay Anderson, first girl Harriet Hobbs.

All runners received chocolate and swanky new style medals.

Many thanks to all local landowners who give permission for the runners to pound their fields.


The all essential food was provided by the women of the village hall committee, the usual high standard upheld. Donations for this will go to the Village Hall funds.
