If you were asked to pick the number 1 global issue in the world today, what would you choose?

I'd like to suggest that it's climate change. I think many of us recognise it but find ways of putting off doing anything about it. That's been true for me until recently.

For this reason, our **Lent course** this year will be about **Creation Care** – which will look at some of the different environmental crises in the world today, including climate change, and how Christians could respond to them.

It's not entirely surprising that environmental issues are often a hard sell – they make us feel gloomy rather than cheerful, and cause us some discomfort when we consider our own lifestyles.

This therefore makes it entirely appropriate to think about these topics during Lent, a season designed for us to be challenged in the way that we live. Lent requires is to ask ourselves the awkward questions we'd rather shy away from – for example, are we more selfish in the way we live our lives than we think we are? This is part of what Lent is about: the only difference this year is that we're doing this while addressing environmental issues.

The course will start on **Thursday March 14**, in **Shapwick Church** at **7.30pm**, and will last for five weeks, ending on Thursday April 11. Each week will include a short introduction with video clips and some factual background, and some time to reflect biblically on the issues. There's more on the Bible on this topic than might be supposed!

We had been looking forward to our February meeting as our guest speaker was Rae alias FoodNerd4life blogger.

Rae has a degree in Food Science and Technology, making her officially a food scientist and she works as a New Product Developer. This means on a daily basis she gets to wear a hair net, lab coat and play with recipes whilst making sure they work in the factory to end up on UK supermarket shelves for everyone to enjoy. Rae works for a premium food company so gets to work with some lovely ingredients. At the start of 2012 Rae was working on developing a lot of savoury products for work, which meant she really didn't want to look at any pastry dishes at home so in turn stopped doing as much baking. Rae started her blog as a way to get back into cooking and baking fun things for my friends and family. If you ask Rae what is the worst thing she has ever made, she will tell you that at school for one of her GCSE Food practical's, she made an Orange and Ginger crème brûlée. She mis-read the recipe and instead of adding 3 tsp of gelatine, added 3 sachets. It had the texture of a bouncy ball and the ginger was raw, and so fiery. So - always read your recipes!!

Who knew there was so much to know about chocolate?. There are three main varieties of cocoa plant are Forastero, Criollo, and Trinitario. The first is the most widely used, comprising 80–90% of the world production of cocoa. The other two have lower yields and tend to be less resistant to diseases. Apparently chocolate is very similar to wine and factors such as soil quality affect the flavour. We sampled some stone ground chocolate Taza Mexican chocolate, and Original Beans Esmeraldas chocolate from Ecuador. Original Beans help to preserve and reforest local Arriba cacao varieties and for each bar of chocolate that is sold, a new tree is planted. And what about Dormouse chocolate which is obviously nothing to do with dormice but became the first Bean to Bar producer in Manchester? All handmade since December 2014. All of their products are hand tempered on marble before being individually moulded and wrapped. We tried chocolate made from Honduran beans by Duffy's Chocolate who are a small-scale producer of quality chocolate. They buy unroasted beans and perform all the rest of the processes themselves, sorting by hand and carefully roasting to bring out all of their natural flavours and drive off the bitterness. The least favourite of the night was a prestige bar, 100% cocoa content made by François Pralus – désolé!



Our March meeting will be on Tuesday 12th March, 7.30 pm and our speaker is Brendan who will be demonstrating Book Art. We will be learning about the craft of creating art from old hardback books into words or pictures. Some creations can take a few hours however it is not as complicated as it may seem, or so we have been told! At our next book club meeting we will be reviewing Lost for Words by Stephanie Butland and at the Film Club, The Greatest Showman.

The Parish Council has a vacancy for one Parish Councillor following the resignation of Rupert Bullock


Have you considered becoming a Parish Councillor?
